CAMPAIGN FOR A LIVING WAGE

Pathway to Possible's **Direct Care Staff are at the heart of what we do**, providing high quality support for our residents with developmental disabilities. Our staff is committed to our population and care deeply about their work; we are committed to recognizing their value through our Campaign for a Living Wage.

When we launched this campaign in 2021, it was the right thing to do. In 2023's increasingly competitive environment, it is the absolute **necessary thing to do** to ensure the continued success of our programs.

P2P is facing a labor market where large retailers are able to offer significantly higher wages - for jobs that require less specialized skill - than what we are currently able to provide to our frontline direct care workforce. This **wage disparity**, when coupled with the **rising cost of living** and the **effects of burnout** from overtime hours in this emotionally, mentally, and physically demanding field, has P2P on the brink of a crisis. Our staff is dedicated, but they are human, and they must consider their own needs and those of their families.

Without significant and sustained community support, Pathway to Possible will continue to lose good people to more competitive opportunities, and it will be our clients who will suffer the most.
